Latest 1mm Laminate Design Trends for 2026

The strongest laminate trends in 2026 are moving beyond simple colour selection. Designers and homeowners are increasingly considering texture, surface character, warmth, contrast and how multiple finishes work together.

1. Natural Woodgrain Laminates

Wood-inspired laminates remain one of the most versatile categories in modern interiors.

Instead of highly repetitive or artificial-looking patterns, current design direction is moving towards more natural-looking grains with subtle variations.

Popular visual directions include:

- Oak-inspired finishes
- Walnut tones
